I. Course Description

The course will cover the biblical story of the Queen of Sheba's visit to King Solomon; a brief survey of ancient Sabean ("Sheba-an") archaeology and culture; stories about the Queen of Sheba in Jewish, Christian, and Muslim traditions; the Queen of Sheba and Solomon as the parents of Ethiopia's first king; the Queen of Sheba in Western art, literature, music, and film.

II. Course Aims and Objectives

To trace how a short episode related in a few verses of the Hebrew Bible / Old Testament came to be interpreted in a wide variety of ways in the three monotheistic religious traditions, as a founding story for Ethiopian national identity, and in the present day.

III. Format and Procedures

In most class meetings there will be a lecture on a particular topic relating to the story of the Queen of Sheba and its interpretations in various early and modern cultures. There will also be time devoted to class discussion of the material in the readings for the week and of the material presented in the lectures.

Q drop Policy
