Course Description: Advanced concepts and theories to promote and restore health of adults with biological problems and related physiological and psychological responses.

Course Objectives: At the conclusion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Examine selected societal, environmental, and technological trends that affect the health of adults.
- 2. Explain self-care processes which promote and restore health in adult clients.
- 3. Explain nursing care, which would promote health in adult clients who are experiencing chronic stress related to physiological and psychological alterations.
- 4. Explain nursing care which would promote health in adult clients who are experiencing acute stress related to physiological and psychological alterations.
- 5. Select and integrate appropriate research findings in the study of adult health.

Evaluation Methods: The course grade will be computed from grades earned on 4 UWorld NCLEX prep assignments, 3 exams, and a comprehensive Final Exam. The percentage formula will be used to score exams. There is no extra credit in this course. Your grade is strictly determined by your exam and participation results. You must have a final grade of 75% or better to pass the course. You must take the final exam to pass the course.

Exams: Exams will consist of multiple-choice NCLEX-style questions. Students will have the opportunity to review their examinations following posting of the exam results by appointment. All exams will be given in class via Canvas with Honorlock. Arrangements can be made on a case by case basis **<u>BEFORE</u>** an exam is given to take it at another time only with the instructor's permission, as documented by an email. Cheating on exams will not be tolerated. Anyone caught cheating will automatically be dropped from the course with a failing grade. Students are not permitted to copy exam questions. You must have your own computer and sufficient bandwidth for taking the exams.

Honorlock Testing Software: All exams in this course will be administered in Canvas using Honolock remote proctoring software. To use Honorlock, your computer must have a working webcam and microphone and you must use Google Chrome as your Web browser.

Exam and course grades will be posted on Canvas, which students may access at http://courses.utexas.edu (using UT EID). Students will have the opportunity to review their completed exams by appointment following posting of the exam results.

UWorld Assignments: (10% of course grade): You are required to complete four UWorld quizzes that are weighted equally (2.5% each) for participation in the final grade. The quizzes completed using the UWorld platform and are open-book quizzes, intended to enhance your practice in answering NCLEX-style questions related to concepts in this course.

UWorld assignments may be completed as many times as required to achieve a 75% minimum. Achievement of this minimum must be completed by the due date to receive full credit (10 points) for the quiz. These assignments are CREDIT or NO CREDIT only. There will be No Make-Ups. No credit will be given if less than 75% is not obtained by the due date.

Carrying of Handguns on Campus
