## **Description**:

The Qur'an/Quran/Koran is the foundational text of Islam, the religion of 1.6 billion Muslims

around the world. It is believed to be revealed to the Prophet Muhammad between 610 and 632 in Arabia. However, what do we really know about the Qur'an? What is it about? What ideas, values and behaviors does the Qur'an promote? How does this text shape or reflect its culture? How does it compare with other literature of the time period?



This course introduces students to the primary text of the Qur'an. We will read and discuss the Qur'an as a humanistic text of world civiliza-



tion. In the end, students will have read the book in its entirety and discussed the major themes of the Qur'an and gained a firm sense of how the Qur'an compares and differs from the Bible.
