Fleshing the Archive: A Field Guide to Chicana Knowledge Praxis in the 1970s is a self-reflexive exploration of the *Chicana por mi Raza* Digital Memory Collective, an oral history and archive repository launched in 2009.

Drawing from both the archival materials and the embodied experience gathered in building the *Chicana por mi*

Raza archive, I offer a genealogy of Chicana knowledge praxis before and after the digital turn. The book's four chapters range across multiple regional and temporal sites to illuminate a stunning cartography of Chicana knowledge projects in the 1960s and 1970s—from community-based research centers, to bibliographies, syllabi, and curricula production, to alternative media projects. Drawing connections between these sometimes ephemeral (and always precarious) efforts to reimagine knowledge as a collective and community-building endeavor and the collaborative ethos of the *Chicana por mi Raza* project, I illuminate the convergence between the digital present and the analog past to suggest a hidden genealogy of Chicana knowledge praxis that mobilizes new objects of study, frames of analysis, and models of scholarly inquiry to build futurities in which Chicanas can survive.

Chicana Por Mi Raza Digital Memory Collective (CPMR)

An ongoing multi-sited digital humanities project centered on collecting oral histories and archival objects documenting Chicanas in the Movement years (1965-1980). The CPMR repository contains 12,000 documents and oral history recordings, and is available via login to researchers, teachers, students, independent scholars, and community education initiatives.
