Course Objective: The objective of this class is to familiarize students with the biological, social, and cultural dimensions of human development, ranging from 10 to 25 years. The course aims to inform students participating in the UTeach for Liberal Arts program about developmental aspects of the lives of students in middle school, high school, and college.

Readings: Your text is: The  $5^{th}$  edition of *Adolescence and Emerging Adulthood: A Cultural Approach* by Jeffrey J. Arnett. This should be available at the Co-op. Ebook versions are acceptable.

**Tests**: There will be three, multiple choice tests in this class. Each one contributes 30% of your total score.  $(3 \times 30 = 90 \text{ points})$ 

**Paper**: This 8-page paper can be handed in any time during the semester, but it must be handed in before the last class day of the course, December 6, 2012. It must be on a topic approved by Falbo. Possible topics are listed on page 3. (10 points)

**Extra Credit**: Students have the opportunity to make a presentation to class about their paper topic, for a maximum of 5 extra credit points. These presentations will be scheduled between October 3 and December 6, 2012. They should take about 10 minutes, and could include power point slides, although the PPT is not required.
