This course uses: texts by academics, economists, legal scholars, political prisoners; as well as online oral history interviews, documentaries, film, and popular culture (Marvel comix *Black Panther*); and, archival research in a the LBJ presidential library. We examine the boundaries of "Black Marxism;" and its relationship to civil rights, human rights, radicalism and black liberation.
