

#### **Course Description**

This course is a study of one of the most traumatic periods in South African history. It is also a study of a people's agency and resilience in the face state sanctioned terror. With a brief detour into the deep past of South Africa to contextualize the rise of apartheid, the course will predominantly focus on the period since 1948. We will study the social, political, economic, and cultural history of a nation in the grip of legalized oppression from the perspectives of women, children, and men - of all "racial" backgrounds - who lived through that particular period. The course will NOT cover everything, but aims to tell that period of South African history through the lens of the late Nelson Mandela's life and times. **Samukele, Kamohelo, Welcome!**

Then there are the lower marks- the D range calls attention to the students who achieved a "passing but unsatisfactory" mark. Likewise, an F range means "failure", and an "I" is an "incomplete" for the course.

Class Attendance and Participation: Though a summer course, this is not a MOOC course or one by correspondence. To that end, your physical and intellectual presence is expected and required each day class meets. However, cognizant of other life factors, you have three (3) classes you can miss without penalty to your attendance and participation grade. If you miss more than 3 classes, that portion of your grade is calculated from 50% down.
