

## **Course Description**

This course is a study of one of the most traumatic periods in South African history. It is also a study of a people's agency and resilience in the face state sanctioned terror. With a brief detour into the deep past of South Africa to contextualize the rise of apartheid, the course will predominantly focus on the period since 1948. Though framed through the lens of the *late Nelson Mandela's life and times* the course aims broaden students' understanding of that period of South African history through ordinary people's economic, social, cultural, and political lives. We will <u>not</u> cover everything, but the course material is designed to offer both depth and breath on the topic. Major **objectives** are: a) a firm grounding in Southern African history through the case study of South Africa in the period studied; b) facilitating the practice of the historian's craft of critical reflection through close reading and analysis of primary sources. This is an intensive reading and writing course that carries writing and global cultures flags. *Samukele*, *Kamohelo*, *Welcome!*

Likewise, an F range means "failure", and an "I" is an "incomplete" for the course.

To that end, your physical and intellectual presence is expected and required each day class meets. However, cognizant of other life factors, you have two (2) classes you can miss without penalty to your attendance and participation grade. If you miss more than 2 classes, that portion of your grade is calculated from 50% down.
