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COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

This course is a study of one of the most traumatic periods in South African History. It is a study of a people's agency and resilience in the face state sanctioned terror. With a brief detour into the deeper past of South Africa to contextualize the rise of apartheid, the course will predominantly focus on the period since 1948. We will study the social, political, economic, and cultural history of a nation in the grip of legalized oppression from the perspectives of women, children, and men - of all "racial" backgrounds - who lived through that particular period. While the course will focus on both oppression and agency, and the in-between-spaces, students are advised that some of the course content (books, audio, and video material) will include violent scenes. The course will NOT cover everything, but aim for a deeper understanding of some of the key moments that illuminate apartheid in the history of South Africa. The course's **two major objectives are**: a) a firm grounding in Southern African history through the case study of South Africa in the period studied; b) learning and practicing the historian's craft of critical reading and reflection through close readings of primary and secondary material – as well as writing. *Sam'kele, Kamohelo, Welcome!*
