Course Objective: The objective of this class is to familiarize students with the psychological, biological, social, and cultural dimensions of human development, focusing on humans who ranging in age from 10 to 25 years. The course aims to inform students participating in the UTeach for Liberal Arts program about developmental aspects of students in middle school, high school, and college.

Text: Your textbook is: The 6th edition of *Adolescence and Emerging Adulthood: A Cultural Approach* by Jeffrey J. Arnett (2018). This should be available at the Co-op. Ebook versions are acceptable. Earlier editions of this textbook will not include critical elements of the 2018 text.

Evaluation: You will have the opportunity to accumulate 100 points during the semester. Each type of product below contributes to your earning these 100 points. Overall: 10(1) + 30(2) + 30 = 100 points

Student Products

- 1. "Thinking Critically" Each chapter has several Thinking Critically sections (some chapters have as few as 4, other chapters have as many as 8). Your job is to select one of these TC per chapter, write a response to the prompt, upload your response to this assignment on canvas by class time of the last day we discuss this chapter in class. We usually take two class periods to discuss a chapter. Overall, you will write 10 TC responses. Since we have 13 chapters, there will be three chapters for which you will chose to not write TC responses. You choose which chapters and which specific TC you write. I recommend writing 5 of your TC responses before the mid-term and 5 after the mid-term. You earn one point for each of the 10 TC responses you write. In order to earn the point, you need to upload the TC response by 12:30 pm of the last day we discuss this chapter in class. (10 X 1 = 10)
- 2. Tests: There will be two multiple choice tests in this class. The tests are based on the textbook. The maximum number of points you can earn for each test is 30. Overall, then, you can earn as many as 60 of your 100 points by answering all the questions correctly. (2 X 30 = 60)
- 3. Paper: This 8-page paper can be handed in any time during the semester, but it must be uploaded

to Canvas on the last class day of the course, December 7, 2017. This must be a fresh paper, meaning that this should not be a paper you have already submitted to another class. Also, you must avoid plagiarism and the paper must be on a topic approved by Falbo. Possible topics are listed below. This is not an essay but a report about what you learn from reading scholarly articles about your topic. You will earn a maximum of 30 points for your work on this paper.

- a. You will earn two of these 30 points when your write a one-page description of what your paper is about and why you are interested in this topic and upload it to canvas on or before October 10, 2017.
- b. **You will earn three more points** of these 30 when you prepare the References of your paper (five or more scholarly articles) in APA format and upload them to canvas on or before December 5, 2017.

Paper: Your (minimum of) 8-page paper should be double-spaced with a title (at the top of the first page, along with your name) and a reference section (at the end). The scoring rubric is below. The paper itself is worth 25 points. You earn an additional 2 points for writing the one-page description (due 10/10) and 3 points for Reference Section (due 12/5). 25 + 2 + 3 = 30.

ORGANIZATION

7= very well organized, paragraphs flow in a logical order, smooth transitions, makes sense and easy to read

- 5 = somewhat well organized, occasional odd/disjointed paragraph
- 2 = not very well organized, paper is difficult to understand
- 0 =organization of paper is so poor it interferes with meaning

FORMATTING/SOURCES

- 5 = at least 5 academic sources used, properly cited in APA format
- 4 = 2-4 academic sources used and/or not properly cited in APA format
- 2 = less than 2 academic sources used and/or not properly cited in APA format
- 0 =No academic sources used.

RELEVANCY OF CONTENT OF PAPER TO TOPIC AND COURSE

- 5 = topic is very relevant and makes sense in the context of the course
- 3 = topic is somewhat relevant
- 0 = topic was unadvisable/ not relevant

ABILITY TO LINK TOPIC TO COURSE MATERIAL

- 8 = paper explains exactly HOW and WHY topic is relevant to previously covered material (reading and lectures)

Overview

- The alternate written assignment will be posted on **Wednesday**, **October 18**th. This is for students who either prefer to not participate in studies or who do not meet the 5-credit requirement by the study completion deadline (below).
- To fulfill this requirement through study participation, you must complete 5 credits of subject pool studies by midnight on **Friday**, **December 1**st. Otherwise, you must write the alternate assignment.
- Alternate assignments are due by midnight on the last class day, Monday, Dec. 11th.
