Trigger Warning

Human Sexuality can be an emotionally charged topic. Some things we discuss may distress you. My very strong preference is for you to power through triggering experiences, since when we avoid things that distress us, our distress is reduced but our world just got smaller. However, do what you need to do to protect yourself. I would hope that you will communicate with me about anything that is triggering for you. It is my job to make our classroom "a safe space for difficult conversations."

Course Overview

Human sexuality and loving relationships will be taught from a psychological perspective with attention to the physiological, emotional, developmental, and relationship dimensions of sexuality. Course goals are to present factual information and to promote scholarly examination of social, personal, and ethical factors in sexual expression. We operate under the assumption that sex and relationships are appropriate and important topics of study, and that our understanding will be enhanced by reading about, thinking about, and discussing many aspects of human sexuality. Virtually everyone will feel some self-consciousness and discomfort with some of the subject matter, but this usually improves fairly quickly. However, if you do not share our belief that it is appropriate and worthwhile to study and discuss sexual issues in the context of the university classroom, this course is probably not for you.

Canvas

You will find all your learning modules, announcements, assignments, readings, and group learning tasks here. We also post interesting links; messages to and from students, TA's, and Daley; and whatever else we see fit. Our e-mails to each other go through Canvas; your grades are posted there; and it's the place where you will turn in your written assignments.

Attendance

This class is as fun as you make it. When people are here and the discussions are lively, we have a better time, your professor is happy, and then everybody's happy. Because I believe "A" students come to class, every now and then attendance will be rewarded. A sign-up sheet will be passed around and everyone in class will receive a couple of points just for being there. There may also be "One-Shot Deal" days when an assignment will be given for extra credit. If you aren't here, you won't receive these opportunities. Please don't ask for "make-up" opportunities on these attendance bonuses.

Classroom Demeanor

Because of the sensitive nature of the course material, rudeness and intentionally harmful behavior will not be tolerated. In a large class, it is important that only one person speak at a time, both as a matter of courtesy and so that everyone will be able to hear class discussions. Students are welcome to make comments or ask questions in class as time permits. If you have questions about the text or

lecture material, your TA will be glad to meet with you for discussion. Students may also make comments or ask questions anonymously by writing them down and leaving them in my mailbox in SZB504. If pertinent, these questions will be addressed by the instructor in future classes. Questions left in the box need not pertain to that day's lecture material.

Guest Speakers

Guest speakers representing a wide range of viewpoints may make presentations to our class. Questions and comments are welcomed within the context of mutual exploration of and respect for differences of opinion.

Class Schedule and Topics

The syllabus schedule is subject to some variability depending upon speaker availability, special topics, and the whim of your instructor. Topics to be covered include: the history of sexual norms; sexual anatomy and physiology; sexual responsiveness; STIs; birth control; unwanted pregnancy; gender roles; rape; the sexual victimization of children; GLBTQ; and love, relationships, and communication. Additionally, discussion groups held within class lecture time will give students the opportunity to explore other topics. **Doing the reading will be a big help.** Your grades will be based upon the following:

1. EXAMS (REQUIRED): There will be 3 exams worth various points each. Exams cover the lecture notes and the readings assigned on Canvas. Other materials in the Modules are optional unless I specifically assign them to you.

I expect everyone to be present for exams and to arrive on time unless previous arrangements have been made. Do not expect to be admitted if you arrive late. Exam scores are posted in the Grading Center on Canvas as quickly as we can get them there.

Although it is difficult to believe, we have observed test-takers examining the tests of their neighbors during an exam, evidently to offer assistance if it is needed. If we have any reason to believe that you are checking out your neighbor's test during an exam, we shall take possession of your test and you will have to schedule a make-up exam with your TA. We do not need to be correct as to whether or not you were in fact cheating. You should be grateful that we do not send you directly to the Dean of Students.

- 2. RESEARCH PARTICIPATION (REQUIRED): This is a Departmental Requirement. You will be contacted about signing up for and participating in a research study in the Department of Educational Psychology. This will occupy a required number of hours. If you are unable to participate in or complete your research, you will be given an alternate assignment by the Research TA (who is not your class TA). FAILURE TO PARTICIPATE IN RESEARCH OR DO ALTERNATE ASSIGNMENT RESULTS IN AN INCOMPLETE FOR THIS COURSE.
- **3. "MEET-UP GROUPS:"** You will each be assigned to a discussion group, meeting more or less weekly to talk about a topic assigned on Canvas. Essays are due **no later than the start of the next class day** (a Monday).

We understand perfectly the attitude many people hold toward work groups, but they're a fact of life here and in the workplace. You group may meet any time and any place, as determined by the majority of members. Our hope is that you will learn points of view about Human Sexuality that you may never have thought about before.

Toward the end of the semester (or sooner if you wish!) your study group will be teaching the class something in the realm of Human Sexuality, past, present or future. Presentations can earn up to 10 points for each group member, so long as your group believes you deserve an equal share. Although it sounds quite onerous, group presentations often end up being everyone's favorite part of the class. Don't ask me why I have to say this, but no non-human animals may be used. All sex depicted must be consensual unless you are specifically covering an aspect of sexual coercion.

- **4. ESSAYS:** Each person writes up their own essay about the group discussion; these should be turned in via Canvas. You will turn in 5 essays of a 400-word minimum during the semester, summaries of your work with your study group. Please include the names of people present for your discussion. These are due on the Monday following Meet-Up Group and are worth up to 10 points each depending on the thoroughness and thoughtfulness of your work, always including your reactions to the thoughts and opinions brought up during group. Submit them through Canvas. No late essays will be accepted, no matter what your excuse.
- **5. CALCULATING GRADES:** Add up the number of points you have earned. Canvas will do the division, nicely rounding up. Canvas then assigns you a letter grade. We do use the +/- system.
