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# **Course Objectives**

The main objective is to familiarize students with the psychological, biological, social, and emotional development of humans during the period from about 10 – 24 years. Students will learn about theories and current research concerning such development and have opportunities to consider competing ideas in these areas. Activities will include lecture, discussions, group work, individual readings, writing, an interview, quizzes, and exams with the purpose of challenging students to construct an understanding of human development that is based on critical inquiry.

## Discussions (20%)

**Leaders (10 %):** You will be assigned to one of the 4 discussions where you will be a discussion leader. As one of the leaders you will find information on the topic and ensure that you and the others have covered enough background for the class to help devise a response to the discussion prompt. Leaders will write about the background information they collect as part of their grade. The rest of the grade is based on the presentation and facilitation of discussion after the presentations.

**Audience Members (10%):** You will write a reflection about the presentation. Your grade will be determined by the average of the three times you will be an audience member.
