Required Materials

Text: Hill and Hult, *Global Business Today*, *11th Edition*, *online edition*. Access it through the "My Textbooks" tab on the Canvas home page. I also recommend reading business publications regularly. The Wall Street Journal has a \$4/month student rate available at wsj.com/studentoffer.

Map: You should have a current map of the world for extra credit on exams.

Course Materials: You will receive credit for completing the LearnSmart module for each chapter as assigned in Canvas. Readings, course slides, and other materials are provided in the Canvas module for each chapter.

You'll receive course updates and communication via a Canvas announcement, which will come to you as an e-mail. If you miss one, you can review it in Announcements. You will be responsible for any course information sent through Canvas.

Because important course updates and communication will be made via e-mail, IT IS VERY IMPORTANT that you have a current official UT e-mail address! You should go to the UT directory <u>right now</u> (https://www.utexas.edu/directory/) and make sure that the e-mail address listed there is the one you want to use to obtain course material. If it is incorrect, use UT Direct (https://utdirect.utexas.edu/utdirect/) to change your official e-mail address. You will be responsible for any course information sent to that e-mail address. Naturally, you should also check your e-mail regularly.

Please ensure you *register your Zoom account with your UT email address.* Otherwise, the system will block any non-UT accounts and you will <u>not</u> be able to access live class lectures.

Course Structure

The text for this "macro" course considers international business mainly from the perspective of aggregate impact and general forces and theories Class discussions and your Country Analysis papers will give you a chance to apply concepts to real-life international business decisions and managerial issues.

Course material will be presented through lectures and the textbook. Course readings for each chapter and supplementary "mini-lectures" are posted in Canvas. Lecture slides will open weekly before each lecture.

How to Succeed

- Come to class weekly ready to participate! I like to reward students who attend weekly with information not found in the textbook or slides.
- Complete the LearnSmart module and any articles assigned for a class day before coming to class. Review the LearnSmart module due dates for each chapter.
- Apply course concepts to current events and supplement your knowledge with the business press. Good options include: The Financial Times, Business Week, Fortune, Forbes, Fast Company, the Wall Street Journal, and The Economist. The most comprehensive are The Financial Times and The Economist.
- You will be graded on your participation in class discussions and group work. It's important for everyone to have an attitude of honesty, openness, and respect.

Exams

Your exam grade will be based on two on-line exams. Exams consist of 35 multiple choice questions plus five extra credit questions on country names and locations. You will also have the opportunity to take an optional comprehensive final consisting of 40 multiple choice questions. The grade on the optional final will replace your lowest exam score. *Note: You cannot lower your grade by taking the final.*

NOTE: You may <u>NOT</u> use your book, the internet, cell phones, PDA's, calculators, or any other personal technology <u>during</u> exams -OR- have them sitting out during the exam.

The professor reserves the right to require Proctorio camera settings "ON" during testing. Please review the academic dishonesty paragraph below.

LearnSmart Modules

You will need to complete the LearnSmart online module for each chapter by the date of the class discussion of that chapter. FYI, modules typically close at 11:30pm the night <u>BEFORE</u> our scheduled chapter lecture (see Canvas calendar). For the Balance of Payments unit, you will take an online quiz. I will drop your lowest grade from this category. *There are no make-ups* - if you miss a LearnSmart module, that will be the one you drop.

Country Analysis Project – 6-paper series

You will submit a series of short papers on a single country. For each one, you will research topics discussed in class as they relate to your chosen country and a company of your choice. You will integrate the information from the assignments into a **final report.** The Country Analysis Project Instructions in Canvas have full details.

Team Discussions

You will work in teams throughout the semester *during* class (time permitting). Together, you will apply course concepts to solve business problems and answer questions. *There are no-make-ups for missed team discussions*. I do not announce when these discussions will take place, so again weekly attendance is important.

Class Participation

Throughout the semester, we will have discussions related to the lectures, readings, and current events. Your participation <u>and</u> team discussion contributions will help determine your class participation score.

Extra Credit

You may earn 5 extra credit points on each exam by identifying countries on maps. Maps for the Exam 1 are South/Central America, Europe, and the Middle East. The maps for Exam 2 are Asia and Africa. The maps will be posted in the Exam module in Canvas.

You <u>might</u> also have an opportunity throughout the semester to earn extra credit by attending designated presentations on global business. These opportunities will be announced as they come up during the semester. These are the only opportunities for extra credit in the course.

Any extra credit will be applied to your most recent test score. If you earn 100 on your exam, no extra credit will be applied (nor moved to a future test score).

Optional Exam

The final is optional. You may take it to replace your lowest exam score. If you're satisfied with your grade before the final exam, **you may skip the final** and will receive the grade you had before the final exam. **Note:** This test date is determined by the final schedule released by UT administration.

Attendance

Because you will work with other students on a Discussion Team, your regular attendance is important to their success as well as your own. The leadership role for group discussions will rotate to ensure everyone is fully contributing.

Professional Conduct for On-line (Synchronous) Class

- Please be on time and ready to start when class begins.
- Please be mindful of your space and surroundings. I will ask that cameras remain turned "ON" during class. Therefore, whatever you can see...we can see too! Please use good judgement as you would an in-person class.
