Course Description:

The primary goals of this course will be to introduce students to the basic elements of Latin grammar, syntax and vocabulary as presented by Wheelock, Chapters 1-25. Our focus will be predominantly directed towards developing the ability to read and understand original and adapted Latin sentences and passages, but we will also explore the culture and lifestyle of Romans under the Republic and Empire, when Latin was a living and developing language. After the completion of this course, students should be comfortable with their foundation in the basics of the Latin language, have a developed arsenal of vocabulary, and feel comfortable working with Latin sentences without preparation.

Grading:

The grade breakdown is as follows:

- Midterm Exams: 45%
- Final Exam: 30%
- Quizzes: 15%
- Attendance and Participation: 10%

Midterm exams will be given at roughly equal intervals throughout the semester, so expect one about every four weeks. Each exam will be cumulative, but will focus on the Wheelock material since the previous exam. It is in your best interest, however, to continue to review material on your own over the course of the entire semester, as the final exam will be cumulative. Elementary Latin learning requires serious effort on the part of you, the student, to prepare yourself for the rigors of reading Real Latin in two semesters' time. The final exam is a useful tool for me to assess your readiness to continue on to Latin 507. MIDTERM EXAM DATES ARE: Monday, September 24th; Monday, October 22nd; and Thursday, November 15th. THE FINAL EXAM IS ON Saturday, December 15th. 9:00am-12:00pm.

- MAKEUP POLICY: I will only allow makeup exams in the case of medical emergency, religious holiday, or documented athletic activity. More to the point: authorized documentation is required for any sort of makeup request. It is your responsibility to notify me as early as possible of any absence. Barring serious medical emergency, you will receive a zero if you do not let me know of your absence beforehand.
- Quizzes will be given every Friday at the beginning of class and will help you review material as we go. That being said, you won't do well on the quizzes and exams if you aren't doing extra study outside of class. To that end I will also give unannounced review quizzes over the course of the semester. Makeup quizzes won't be offered, but I will allow you to drop your two lowest quiz scores at the end of the semester.
- Attendance and Participation: Attendance and participation are vital to your success in this course. As with learning any language, daily, active learning is the only way to internalize grammar and vocabulary. Even if I don't say anything in class, I'm going to be paying attention to who is looking at their phone or screwing around. Showing up is good, but you will not get an A in the class unless you come ready to participate every day. Successful participation involves asking questions, responding to instructor questions, and volunteering to translate in class.Mistakes are part of the learning process, so I encourage you to be ready to jump into our discussions even if you aren't sure of the right answer or didn't do your homework last night. Because of the direct correlation between attendance and success in Latin, I'm allowing three absences over the course of the semester. Each further absence will result in 1% off your final grade. As a final note, please do not show up late to my class. Two tardies will equal an absence.

However, please note: **Per departmental policy, you must receive a grade of C or higher in order to be allowed to move on to Latin 507.**

Your fellow students are your best resource for success, and I encourage you to work in groups as you do your homework and study for exams. Also remember that my office hours are there specifically for you to come in and ask questions. Come to my office hours. **Come to my office hours. COME TO MY OFFICE HOURS.**

I'm also generally reachable by email, so feel free to send me one. I guarantee a 24 hour response time to all emails, but I'm usually much quicker than that. If you show me that you want to put in the effort, I'll do everything I can to help you succeed. You get the grade you earn.

Because of the pace required to get through the first 25 chapters of Wheelock, this schedule won't likely be changed. Latin 507 will assume you know it, so I have to teach it to you. It's up to you to do extra work on areas you're struggling with, so please come see me if you're having trouble.
