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COURSE DESCRIPTION

Rules of law govern many aspects of business. An understanding of legal rules and ethical guidelines provides a framework for making sound business decisions, facilitates commercial transactions, and promotes order in the marketplace.

This course focuses on the organization and operation of the American legal system, legal rules and ethical guidelines that impact business, and the practical application of these rules and guidelines to real-world situations. Emphasis is placed on analytical problem solving and ethical decision making.

Prerequisite for this course: Credit or registration for Business Administration 324 or 324H.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Our study of the legal and ethical environment of business is designed to help students accomplish the following objectives:

- (1) Recognize legal and ethical issues when making business decisions.
- (2) Gain an enhanced understanding of legal rules and ethical guidelines.
- (3) Improve analytical problem solving and ethical decision making skills.
- (4) Apply knowledge and skills to address and manage potential problems before they become actual, expensive problems.
- (5) Evaluate expert advice and determine the extent to which it should be incorporated into business decisions.

Attendance

An attendance sheet is circulated at the beginning of each class. **Each student is responsible for signing the sheet, which is the only measure of attendance**. If you are in your seat at the beginning of class and remain for the entire class period, signify present with your signature. If you arrive late or leave early, mark "tardy" and include the time of your arrival/departure.

If you plan to be absent to observe a religious holy day or to participate in an event sponsored by the University, notify me at least fourteen days prior to your absence. If you miss a class for any other reason, you must notify me by e-mail before the class begins.

Class Participation

Class participation consists of court cases from the textbook, assigned in advance, that you brief and present in class.

<u>Briefs</u>: A brief is a written summary of a case. It consists of: (1) the <u>essential facts</u> (what happened between the parties and, if the case has been appealed, the decision of the lower court), (2) the <u>issue(s)</u> to be resolved, (3) the court's <u>resolution</u> of the issue(s), and (4) the **rationale** for the court's decision.

Posted on Blackboard each weekend are PowerPoint slides for the upcoming week. Case assignments are included in these slide shows. Students are responsible for reviewing the slides every weekend to see which cases are assigned for the following week.

Exams

Exams are <u>open-book and open-note</u>, testing your ability to analyze hypothetical situations and determine the extent to which various legal rules and ethical guidelines apply. No one is allowed to leave the room while an exam is being given. Students must <u>remain in the classroom for the entire exam period</u>.

There are <u>no make-up exams</u>. If you miss <u>either</u> exam #1 <u>or</u> exam #2, the percentage assigned to the exam you have missed is applied to the final exam. Therefore, if you miss exam #1, your final exam is worth 45% of your overall grade. If you miss exam #2, your final exam is worth 50% of your final grade. If you miss <u>both</u> exam #1 <u>and</u> exam #2, the percentage assigned to exam #1 is applied to the final exam (your final exam is worth 45% of your overall grade), and you receive a zero on exam #2 (worth 20% of your overall grade). <u>Dropping an exam grade is not an option</u> in this course. <u>Once you have taken an exam, the score is factored into your overall grade</u>.

Ethics Assignment

This assignment presents an ethical dilemma for you to analyze, using the business ethics material from this course. You must identify the ethical issue, propose defensible ways to resolve the issue, recommend a course of action from among the proposed alternatives, and include the rationale for your recommendation. Your work must be typewritten and single-spaced, not to exceed two pages in length, and submitted to me <u>at the beginning of class on Friday, April 5</u>. **Points are deducted for late submissions**.

CLASS RULES

To minimize distractions in the classroom:

- (1) <u>Laptops must be closed and put away</u>. The Course Outline provides ample space for handwritten notes.
