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Course Description

This course is a systematic introduction to medical terminology. You will learn the Latin and Greek prefixes, roots, and suffixes that make up the vast majority of words used in the medical field. You will learn the basics of analysis and correct pronunciation of medical terminology. This course is designed for students interested in pursuing a career in healthcare, so no prior knowledge of Latin or Greek is required.

Course Objectives

Upon completion of the course learners will:

- Define prefixes, roots, and suffixes in medical terminology
- Create medical terminology using learned prefixes, roots and suffixes
- Identify word meanings using learned prefixes, roots and suffixes
- Apply learned medical terminology in context
