## **Course Description**

How is Christianity in Egypt different from Christianity in the U.S.? What is Zoroastrianism? Is there a relationship between Islam and the Baha'i religion? These are the types of questions that this course is intended to answer. The course will provide an overview of the religious landscape of the Middle East, with units on Zoroastrianism, Judaism, Eastern Christianity, Islam, and the Baha'i religion. Attention will be given to cosmological doctrines, scriptures, moral principles, sacred history, and liturgical practices, with considerable attention to the historical development of these traditions. This course carries a Global Cultures flag.

### **Course Requirements**

NOTE: Modifications may be made to the course requirements during the term. Students will be notified of modifications to the syllabus either in class, via email or via Canvas. It is the student's responsibility to provide the instructor with a valid email address and to check email regularly. Registrar-held email addresses will be assumed to be valid unless the student informs the instructor otherwise. In the event that a student is absent from class, lacks internet access, or any such issue, it is the student's own responsibility to stay informed of any communications and modifications regarding the course and its requirements.

**Tests and Final Exam** will be based on lectures *and* readings. Make-up tests and exam will only be at instructor discretion and only if the reason is compelling and documented.

For extenuating circumstances, a note and/or prior permission may mitigate the effect of an absence from class. Extra Credit Reports: Extra credit opportunities will be available throughout the semester, in the form of approved lectures and/or events. Reports must include complete headings, including the student name, eid, date of submission, and whether the report is meant to be "Extra Credit Report #1" or "Extra Credit Report #2." Reports must also include a title, which provides the following information: the name of the lecture/event, the

name of the speaker(s), the date of the event, and the location of the event. Reports must be submitted electronically to the instructor within two weeks of the event or the last day of classes, whichever comes first.
