COURSE DESCRIPTION

When we think about communication, what comes to mind first is act or process of using words, sounds, or behaviors to express or exchange information. What we often take for granted or overlook, is the significance of communication through visual means. The information we perceive and comprehend through images, symbols, texture, color and form are oftentimes more immediate and essential than what is communicated through texts. Before electronic media, the internet, face book, computer and even before newspapers, magazines the printed word in its many versions, there was the visual image. The visual image told the story and it could influence the people, shake up despots and incite the population to riot. This is the history of the print. Visual Essay Through Print course will introduce students to a series of material and process based visual exercises, to help them gain the understanding of essential visual elements and methods of visual communication. We will explore the visual and conceptual potential of a variety of materials and processes, combining digital technology and traditional print and printmaking techniques. Through analytical and critical discussions, students go through collective and independent inquiries and learn ways of formulating creative concepts and genuine personal expression within a contemporary context. The final project of the course, Visual Essay Through Print, will investigate a topic of the students' choice—including but not limited to cultural issues, personal identities, social issues, technology, design, and political or environmental concerns.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. **Critical Thinking Skills:** Practice creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information. The course cultivates creativity, problem seeking, and problem solving skills. The course assignments emphasize conceptual clarity and innovative visual communication.
- 2. **Communication Skills**: Investigate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication. Identify, describe, analyze, and evaluate the visual elements and effectiveness of communication in the work of classmates, and works of art, craft, and design from a variety of historical traditions.
- 3. **Teamwork**: Master the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.
- Group critiques and discussions: Students receive feedback through constructive criticism from peers in a supportive class environment.

- Students are assigned in small teams to go through the "brainstorm" exercise during their conceptual inquiry, and help each other refine their initial ideas into clear concepts.
- One-on-one peer written review and critique of assignment.
- 4. **Craftsmanship**: to become familiar with various hands-on processes and several traditional and digital techniques and technology, and cultivate good studio working habits and time management

SIGNATURE COURSE MISSION & COURSE ESSENTIALS

The Signature Courses at the University of Texas at Austin will connect students with distinguished faculty members in unique learning environments. SITE VISITS/ GEMS OF THE UNIVERSITY

Over the course of the semester we will be making Site Visits. Several visits will be to UT's "Gems", such as the Harry Ransom Center Archives, The Blanton Museum of Art, and the Landmarks collection. Other visits may be scheduled.

WRITING FLAG

This course is a Writing Flag Course. Writing Flag courses are designed to give students experience with writing in an academic discipline. Writing Flag classes meet the Core Communications objectives of Critical Thinking, Communication, Teamwork, and Personal Responsibility, established by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board. Students are required to write a research essays based on course activities and visits to University Gems. Accompanying this essay, students will also deliver a digital presentation to the class. A project description informing the final Visual Essay project's content, composition, and concept should be submitted with the final project.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

1. I allow up to 3 absences in this course considering special circumstances that you may encounter, such as illness or family emergency. Each additional absence may result in a one step reduction on the grading scale.

Writing: Research paper, video screening written response, written critique, final essay accompanying the Visual Essay assignment. 30%

Oral Presentation: Oral presentation with projected images (Power point or Keynote) of assigned artist, based on library and University Gem visit and research. 20%

Discussion: Students are expected to actively participation in small group and full class discussions. Students will critique peer work, discuss artist work samples and evaluate visual elements, strategies, creativity and meaning. 20%

Information Literacy: Library research assignment. Students will make use of university literacy and technology resources including Lynda.com. 10%

Gems of the University: Site visits and discussions. Research project designed around University Gems such as the Blanton Museum of Art and the Harry Ransom Center. 10%

University Lecture Series: 10%

Students will provide oral and written feedback for their peers. Students will conduct critique and provide feedback for the visual components of the assignments as well as the oral research presentation and the research essay.
